ORGANIZATION PROFILE



Founded by Christopher Joseph (Joy Gill) in September 2018, Life Tree Foundation was born out of a deep desire to serve the underprivileged people of India. The prevailing poverty and injustice move us from within to radically respond to the needs of the poor, the forgotten and the marginalized people of India. In other words, simply put, Life Tree Foundation is 'Love in Action!'

Under THE SCHOOLBAG PROJECT, LTF runs a high-quality, English medium school for children from the underprivileged and lower income group community in the city of Gurgaon, National Capital Region of Delhi, India.

Life Tree Foundation also plans to provide National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) coaching to working class youth from lower income group (like pantry boys, security guards, housekeeping staff, etc) so that they can pass grades 10 and 12 and move towards better careers.

Over time, Life Tree Foundation would also like to start other educational institutions, such as high-quality schools across various towns in North India as well as well-equipped and adequately-staffed Basic Literacy Centers (BLCs) and Adult Literacy Centers (ALCs) in various communities and villages.

We would also like to impart training in basic computer skills, spoken English, personality development, career counseling, music, and dance classes for the grooming and all-round development of underprivileged youth build their confidence and help them establish themselves in relevant career options.

LTF also plans to initiate activities in the distribution of necessary items such as clothes, food, shoes, stationery, blankets, bags etc.

OBJECTIVES



EDUCATION

1. To open schools in Gurgaon for the underprivileged children that provides high-quality education in a Christian environment.
2. To start other educational institutions, such as high-quality schools across various towns in North India as well as well-equipped and adequately staffed basic literacy centres and adult literacy centres in villages.
3. Locate unschooled children and enrolling them in school.
4. Open Coaching centres for students/working youth from economically weak backgrounds to pass grades 10 and 12 through National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS).
5. To grant scholarships, stipends or subsidy to needy students for higher (post-secondary) education.
6. Tuition centres for children who need extra help in their studies.
7. Basic literacy centres for children aged 6 to 13. Children (who would otherwise remain illiterate) will be taught reading, writing and basic mathematics along with other basic life skills such as health, hygiene, and awareness about how to stay safe from traffickers.
8. Adult literacy centres for those above 14 years. People who have remained illiterate will be taught reading, writing and basic mathematics, along with other basic life skills such as health and hygiene.
9. Vocational training / skill development centres. Once the adults are given basic literacy, they will also be provided support to enrol in vocational courses in order to improve their career prospects. For this, we plan to tie up and be a part of the Indian Government's policy on Skills Mission for building skill capability.

CARE FOR CHILDREN

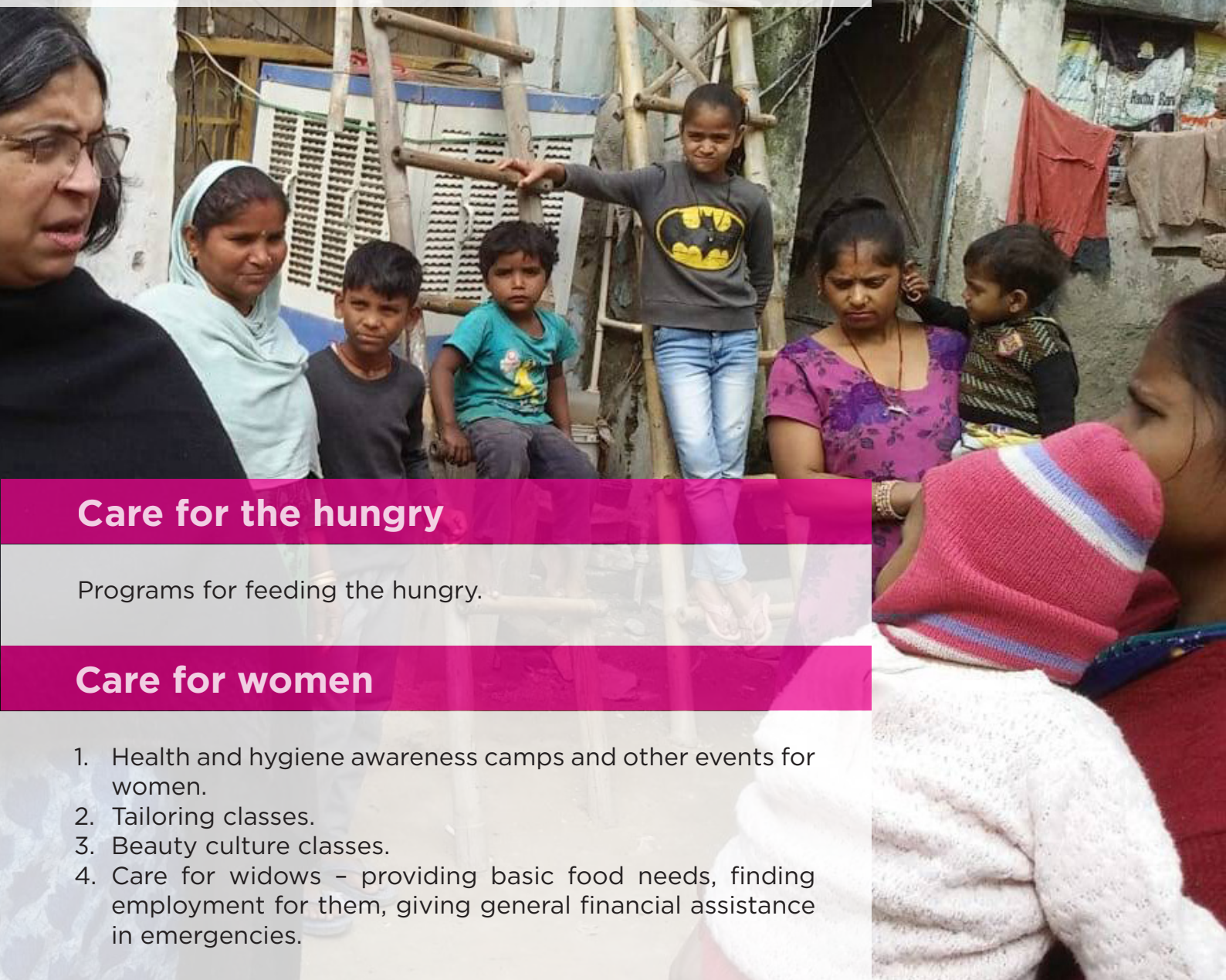
1. A day-care centre for children from families where both parents are working. Several young mothers need to work to make ends meet, but are unable to do so because of the unavailability of affordable and secure day-care for their children. We would like to start a day-care to meet this need.
2. Health and nutrition programs for children. Our city has several pockets of slum communities spread all over the city, where the children are deprived of basic health and nutrition needs. Our field workers will go into these localities and ensure that no child is deprived of these basic needs.

2. Advocacy - becoming voice to the voiceless, such as those caught in child labour, sexual abuse victims, domestic violence victims, etc.
3. Celebrating significant days like AIDS Day, Women's Day, Environment Day, Girl Child Day, No Tobacco Day, etc.
4. Organizing blood donation camps, etc.

THE GENESIS



- Less than half of India's Children between the age group of 6 to 14 go to school.
- At least 35 million children aged 6-14 years do not attend school.
- In India, only 53% of habitation has a primary school and only 20% has a habitation of secondary school.
- On an average, an upper primary school is 3 km away in 22% of areas under habitations.
- On an average, there are less than three teachers per primary school. They have to manage classes from I to V every day.

Before the formation of the Trust, the founders had been working informally with children for over 8 years, during which many of their attempts (and humble accomplishments) at education of underprivileged children and other social initiatives inspired them to start a formal structure so that many more children can be benefitted across the city and the nation!

Hence, the facts available for all to see and the personal experiences of the founding team became the inspiration behind the genesis of Life Tree Foundation.

Inception

Moved the above facts and the need to do more in the development of India, Life Tree Foundation was founded by Christopher Joseph (Joy Gill) as an educational and charitable Trust on 5th September 2018. The founding Trustees view it as a calling to respond to & address the needs of the poor, the forgotten, the marginalized and underprivileged people of India.



EDUCATION: The Schoolbag Project



After registration, the organization immediately initiated immense think-tank dialogues and active research and community engagement to plan the structure and commence the functioning of its first project, 'The Schoolbag Project' also known as 'The LTF School Project'. This project solely focuses on experiential learning of basic education to excel amongst the school goer age groups specifically for the underprivileged children in Gurugram, with a vision to multiply its multi-site project initiatives over the years.

Development & Strategy Team

The Chief Dreamers i.e., the Founders met individuals across various networks who weigh their expertise in various diverse avenues, especially from the fields of education and social work. The founder and his team conducted active-research survey analysis, which led to the aligning of the proposal for the 'The Schoolbag Project' and further curated a volunteer team for development & strategy team to recognize the realistic initiatives towards building this project.

Identifying School Building

We hired a school premises on lease w.e.f. 15th Jan 2019 at a monthly rent of INR 50,000 + 18% GST. The building premises

was undertaken at a lease of 11 months, which will be renewed annually every 11 months with mutual understanding. The premises have 4 classrooms, with an open hall at the entrance, along with ample ground area for children to play and have several other educational as well as recreational activities. The respective rented property is a government-approved School Site





Infrastructural Development

In regards with the infrastructural remodeling of the LTF School building, there were couple of initiatives undertaken to improve the infrastructural cohesiveness for better functioning.

- **Installation of Electricity meter connection**

An 8KVA electricity meter connection was applied with DHBVN Board, which was successfully installed.

- **Cleaning & Sanitation**

The playground which is an open area surrounding the LTF School building needed a lot of cleaning work along with leveling the ground which was ensured to get the place ready to be used by children as playground area for Children's open area activity. An installation of additional water-tank was ensured to avoid shortage of storage water at the LTF School.

- **Office-room partition & recreation**

The LTF School building required more work to enable its full functioning as operational. Office partitions as well as partition for additional classroom were pending. All the internal walls of the classroom and corridor have been colorfully decorated to ensure its ambience is invitational for the children.

- **Safety & Security Enhancements**

The boundary wall height was raised along with installing a separate gate for individual entry & exit for children to ensure safety of children during the school hours. This was ensured to undertake the minimum measures for the safety and security of the children.





Premises repairs & enhancements

The repairs for the boundary wall as well as the main gate were fixed along with completing the interior work on the main walls. All the classrooms were re-painted with different colors; the outside walls of the LTF School were painted with different colors and together this gave a complete facelift to the school site. At the entrance of the LTF School, a huge hall existed. We created two rooms out of the hall. One of the rooms became the Activity Room for the children and other partition was dedicated as the office space.



Ground Work

Resource Material Handbooks

The Founder & Managing Trustee, Mr. Christopher Joseph conducted his detailed analysis on the rules and regulations of the National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS), to which the LTF School has obtained its accreditation. An academic manual of NIOS and an administrative handbook were printed as according to the guidelines of NIOS pattern of education, its rules and regulation.

Mission 100

The Executive Team kept a baseline target of Mission 100, which primarily focuses to ensure 100 underprivileged children to be enrolled onto the admission of the school from the surrounding cluster communities.



On-Site Surveys

Mr. Duke Thomas conducted on-site field surveys of the target beneficiary villages and marginalized economical weaker communities to ascertain various education needs of the respective communities, along with understanding their concerns and encouraging parents from low-income groups to ensure sending their children for education at LTF School. In the survey, it was realized that most of the beneficiaries of the LTF School Program are from the migrant laborer's & informal sector individuals belonging from the Indian states of Bengal, Bihar, Orissa, Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand & Uttarakhand.

Record Keeping

Mr. Prashant Kuttickal, one of LTF's active trustees, developed an online platform for seamless and synchronized record-keeping of all student-related information.

Mr. Duke Thomas was appointed as the Project Coordinator, as he came on board with diverse experience of professional workplace for 20 years. Equally, Mrs. Reena Kuttickal was appointed by the Trustees of the Board for Life Tree Foundation to be Academic Head of the LTF School.

Keeping in accord with the academic rush and with a vision to navigate seamless interaction with parents and provide a smooth admission procedure, the LTF School team felt the requirement to recruit a staff, who would assist in Project Execution. Ms. Rebecca Jamir got onboard as an immediate staff who would deal with parents, admission form processing, data gathering, admission charges collection, parent's contribution collection, follow-ups and other miscellaneous tasks.

The Schoolbag Project team finalized four teaching staff as per its expectations to work full-time and along with one part-time instructor for learner's lab activity for students. All the faculty instructors are NTT certified and/or hold a university degree on Bachelor of Education.

To precursor on above recruitment, Mrs. Snehlata Gupta had initially joined the organization as a volunteer to assist in decoration, educational boards and notice boards for announcements. Based on the evaluation of her performance, she was recruited as a full-time mentor/teacher who holds a university degree on Bachelor of Education and continues to be committed towards her tasks. Equally, Ms. Mary Das, the part-time staff, has been incredibly creative and passionate about her work along with our regular full-time teachers.





Volunteer Development

Initiatives undertaken by several volunteers resulted for creative ideas towards networking for raising funds as well as pitching the word about the project across various strategic stakeholders.

Creative Painting of the School premises:

Volunteers took great interest in ensuring that the ambience of the school looked more appealing, attractive and connecting to the students. A team of womenfolk volunteers took initiatives to paint the inside walls of the corridor with artistic and colorful paintings about the themes of flora and fauna; with the focus to align the academic sections for students more inviting, friendly and child centric.

A prime example, Ms. Snehlatha Gupta, was amongst the womenfolk from the neighborhood community, who would spend time and volunteer in decorating educational and notice boards for the LTF school.

Not only the women though, but the men were also equally involved in painting the outside walls of the school. The otherwise white barren walls now looked so much more attractive.





Project Promotion



Initiatives for project promotion were undertaken such as pamphlets, informative website as well as Poster/Sign Boards. Around 10,000 pamphlets about LTF School were distributed around the nearby towns and communities via flyers on the newspapers. Pamphlet distribution was effective in enrolling few admissions, as it projected to be a great tool in spreading the word around the area. A dedicated and fully updated **informative website** for 'The Schoolbag Project' was made live at www.schoolbagproject.in (which has now been merged with the organizational website).

Moreover, two **sign boards** were installed at the front wall of the LTF School building, both in bilingual languages, English & Hindi in order to enable the generic public connect with the project locally.

As Life Tree Foundation, looks forward to creating impact of its presence to the nearby communities, we organized various contact programs and field visits, which proved to be fruitful.



Admissions

The LTF School admissions were initiated from 1st Feb 2019, and 51 students were enrolled in 'The Schoolbag Project' by the end of the financial year. Many more children from Economically Weaker Sections (EWS) were still in the process of getting enrolled in the admission procedure by the end of the year. The able parents deposited their token registration fee along with their monthly contribution as well as children's admission forms.



On later note, it was observed that several admissions were predominantly from the DLF Phase III area, as the families were known to the Founders & Trustees. It was a chain-reaction to the previously gained goodwill and respect in this community over the years prior to the formation of the Trust. This resulted in procuring ample admissions from this zone.





Launch of the LTF School (The School Bag Project)

Our First project, **'The Schoolbag Project'** was “formally” launched with a Dedication Ceremony held on the 30th of March. It was a great blessing! A lot of groundwork was done on various fronts. We were so encouraged to see Life Tree Foundation School already buzzing with activity!







Other Project-Centric Accomplishments

A great deal of time was spent in inviting quotations for classroom seating for 100 children across four classrooms.

The School Head, Ms. Reena Kuttickal, met all the families of the students admitted.

Applied for 80G and 12A through the CA firm, Koshi & George.

The Founder & Managing Trustee, Mr. Christopher Joseph, continued his relentless pursuit in raising sponsors and donors.

We even set up a sponsorship table at community gathering at DBF Gurgaon and were able to sign up several sponsors.

We finalized the books and the curriculum. We selected Manoj Publications for Pre- Primary and NCERT & Arya Publications for Class 1 onwards. We placed orders for textbooks (for all classes) and the books arrived on 30th of March.





